28 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:



29 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as 30 the Students' Right to Know Act of 2023. 31 Section 2. This act requires the Alabama Commission on 32 Higher Education to provide information to students to allow 33 those students to make informed decisions about their 34 education and professional future. 35 Section 3. As used in this act, the following terms 36 shall have the following meanings: 37 (1) COMMISSION. The Alabama Commission on Higher 38 Education. 39 (2) DIVISION. The Workforce Development Division of the Department of Commerce that administers or oversees the 40 41 state's workforce programs, state job board, or any type of 42 workforce program that receives funding from the United States 43 Department of Labor. Section 4. The commission shall collect and compile all 44 45 of the following information on an annual basis: 46 (1) The 50 most in-demand jobs in the state and their 47 corresponding starting salaries and education level requirements. 48 49 (2) The average cost for all colleges and universities 50 in the state. 51 (3) The average monthly student loan payment for 52 individuals attending colleges and universities in the state, 53 by institution. 54 (4) The average three-year student loan default rate for all colleges and universities in the state. 55 56 (5) The average total student loan debt for graduates Page 2



57 of colleges and universities, for two-year, four-year, and 58 graduate programs.

59 (6) The average four-year graduation rate for all60 universities in the state.

61 (7) The average graduation rate for all community62 colleges in the state.

63 (8) The completion rates for apprenticeship programs,
64 high school credential programs, and career and technical
65 education programs.

66 (9) The average salary one year after graduation by67 college or university major.

(10) The average salary one year after completion of an
apprenticeship program, high school credential program, or
career and technical education program.

(11) The base pay for newly enlisted service members. Section 5. (a) The commission shall create an interactive online tool, known as the Student Horizon Database, to publish and provide to individuals information including, but not limited to, the following:

(1) The 50 most popular education programs in colleges,
universities, and career and technical education programs in
the state based on information collected in Section 4.

79 (2) A searchable database capable of comparing all of80 the following based on users' selections:

a. Average annual cost, including average financialassistance.

b. Average annual cost, not including any financialassistance.



85 c. Graduation rate. 86 d. Average salary after attending, but not completing, 87 a college or university program. 88 e. Average salary for individuals completing one of the 89 five most popular majors at a college or university. 90 f. Full-time enrollment. 91 q. Percentage of students not in default of student 92 loans. 93 h. Average total debt after graduation. i. Percentage of students receiving federal loans. 94 95 j. Average monthly student loan payments for graduates. k. Average monthly student loan payments for 96 97 nongraduates. 1. Percentage of students who return after their first 98 99 year. m. Graduation, withdrawal, transfer, and current 100 enrollment rates for students within eight semesters after 101 102 enrollment. 103 (b) The database shall allow students to have the 104 option of selecting a specific major or course of study at a 105 specific institution, and be able to reasonably identify all 106 of the information referenced in this section. 107 Section 6. On or before October 31, 2024, and each 108 October thereafter, the commission shall publish and make 109 available to high school students a Student Graduate Horizon 110 Scorecard that shall contain all of the following data, collected and aggregated pursuant to this act: 111 112 (1) The 50 highest paying four-year degrees.



(2) The 20 highest paying career and technicaleducation and certificate programs.

(3) The 25 most in-demand jobs in the state and their corresponding starting salaries and education requirements.

(4) The base pay, benefits, and average signing bonus for enlistment in the military, along with the necessary Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) score by the military branch.

121 Section 7. The commission shall issue an annual report 122 to the Legislature outlining the effectiveness of colleges, 123 universities, or any other postsecondary education 124 institutions accepting public funding in aligning their 125 curricula or programs with the state job market, including the 126 degree to which they contribute to filling the most in-demand 127 jobs in the state.

Section 8. The commission and the division shall enter into a memorandum of understanding to share any data or information necessary to comply with this act.

Section 9. To satisfy the requirements of this act, the commission may do either of the following:

(1) Utilize and incorporate preexisting databases, such as the United States College Scorecard, administered by the federal department of education, as well as any other data sets available to the commission.

137 (2) Compel colleges and universities to collect and138 provide information or data as necessary.

139 Section 10. The commission shall adopt any necessary140 rules to implement this act.



Section 11. This act shall become effective January 1, 2024, following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
