7	AN ACT
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9	Relating to health care facilities; to add Section
10	22-21-437 to the Code of Alabama 1975; to require health care
11	facilities to adopt certain visitation policies; to provide
12	that patients have a right to certain visitation; to allow
13	patients to designate an essential caregiver and to guarantee
14	that caregiver certain visitation rights; to prohibit a health
15	care facility from adopting a visitation policy that is more
16	stringent than certain employee policies; to prohibit a health
17	care facility from requiring visitors to show proof of
18	vaccination or from prohibiting consensual physical contact
19	between visitors and patients; to provide for the
20	circumstances in which patients may not be denied visitors who
21	are not essential caregivers; to require health care
22	facilities to provide visitation policies to the Department of
23	Public Health; to require the Department of Public Health to
24	develop a mechanism for complaints; to provide certain
25	immunity from liability in certain circumstances; to exempt
26	certain psychiatric care facilities from the provisions of
27	this bill; and to repeal Sections 22-21-430 through 22-21-436,
28	Code of Alabama 1975, relating to hospital visitation during a



29 public health emergency.

30 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

31 Section 1. The Legislature finds that Representative 32 Debbie Wood, whose mother, Peggy Hamby, succumbed to COVID-19, 33 is forever remembered by the Alabama Legislature in the spirit 34 of this bill. This bill represents Mrs. Hamby and the 35 countless Alabamians who tragically lost relatives and loved 36 ones during the COVID-19 pandemic.

37 Section 2. Section 22-21-437 is added to the Code of 38 Alabama 1975, to read as follows:

39 \$22-21-437

40 (a) This section shall be known and may be cited as the41 Harold Sachs and Anne Roberts Act.

42 (b) For the purposes of this section, the term "health 43 care facility" means a general acute hospital, long-term care 44 facility, skilled nursing facility, intermediate care 45 facility, assisted living facility, or specialty care assisted 46 living facility.

(c) A resident, client, or patient of a health care facility shall have the right to be visited by any individual of his or her choosing during the facility's visiting hours, subject to the requirements of the health care facility's policies and procedures, which shall be consistent with this section and established in accordance with subsection (d).

(d) No later than 30 days after the effective date of this act, each health care facility shall establish visitation policies and procedures. The policies and procedures must, at a minimum, include each of the following:

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57 (1) Infection control and education policies for58 visitors.

59 (2) Screening, personal protective equipment, and other
 60 infection control protocols for visitors.

61 (3) The permissible length of visits and numbers of62 visitors in accordance with this section.

63 (4) Designation of an individual responsible for64 ensuring that staff adhere to the policies and procedures.

(e) (1) Safety-related policies and procedures may not
be more stringent than those established for the facility's
staff and may not require visitors to submit proof of any
vaccination or immunization. The policies and procedures must
allow consensual physical contact between a resident, client,
or patient and the visitor.

71 (2) The policies and procedures shall allow any visitor 72 who is 18 years of age or younger to be accompanied by an 73 adult during visitation.

74 (f)(1) A resident, client, or patient may designate a 75 visitor who is a family member, friend, guardian, or other 76 individual as an essential caregiver. The resident, client, or 77 patient may designate a different essential caregiver each 78 day, if he or she chooses. Additionally, he or she may 79 establish a rotation designating who his or her essential 80 caregiver will be on a given day. The health care facility shall allow in-person visitation by the essential caregiver 81 for at least two hours daily in addition to any other 82 visitation authorized by the facility. This subsection does 83 84 not require an essential caregiver to provide necessary care



85 to a resident, client, or patient of a facility, and 86 facilities may not require an essential caregiver to provide 87 such care. 88 (2)a. If a patient, client, or resident is incapacitated and unable to designate an essential caregiver, 89 one of the following shall appoint an essential caregiver on 90 91 behalf of the patient, client, or resident, in the following 92 order of priority: 93 1. The individual's guardian, as defined by Section 26-2A-20. 94 95 2. The individual's durable power of attorney, as provided in Section 26-1-2. 96 97 b. If the individual does not have a guardian or a 98 durable power of attorney, a family member shall appoint an 99 essential caregiver on behalf of the patient, client, or resident, in the following order of priority: 100 1. The individual's spouse. 101 102 2. The individual's child or children, provided the 103 child or children has reached 19 years of age or older. 104 3. The individual's parent or parents. 105 4. The individual's sibling or siblings. 106 c. An individual appointing an essential caregiver on 107 behalf of an incapacitated patient, client, or resident may 108 appoint a caregiver in the same manner as provided in 109 subdivision (1). (q) The visitation policies and procedures required by 110 this section must allow in-person visitation in all of the 111 112 following circumstances, unless the resident, client, or



113 patient objects:

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(1) End-of-life situations.

(2) A resident, client, or patient who was living with family before being admitted to the health care facility's care is struggling with the change in environment and lack of in-person family support.

(3) The resident, client, or patient is making one or more major medical decisions.

121 (4) A resident, client, or patient is experiencing 122 emotional distress or grieving the loss of a friend or family 123 member who recently died.

124 (5) A resident, client, or patient needs cueing or
125 encouragement to eat or drink which was previously provided by
126 a family member or caregiver.

127 (6) A resident, client, or patient who used to talk and128 interact with others is seldom speaking.

129 (7) For hospitals, childbirth, including labor and130 delivery.

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(8) Pediatric patients.

(h) The policies and procedures may require a visitor to agree in writing to follow the health care facility's policies and procedures. A health care facility may suspend in-person visitation of a specific visitor if the visitor violates the facility's policies and procedures.

(i) (1) Each health care facility shall provide its
visitation policies and procedures to the Alabama Department
of Health when applying for initial licensure, licensure
renewal, or change of ownership. The health care facility must

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141 make the visitation policies and procedures available to the 142 agency for review at any time, upon request.

(2) Within 24 hours after establishing the policies and procedures required under this section, health care facilities must make the policies and procedures easily accessible from the homepage of their websites.

147 (3) The Alabama Department of Public Health shall 148 dedicate a stand-alone page on its website to explain the 149 visitation requirements of this section and provide a link to 150 the agency's webpage to report complaints.

151 (j) An individual may not bring a civil action against a health care facility, its employees, or its contracted staff 152 153 for injuries sustained because of the acts or omissions of a 154 health care facility, its employees, or its contracted staff 155 taken in compliance with this section, unless the complaining party can show by substantial evidence that the health care 156 157 facility, its employees, or its contracted staff failed to 158 follow this section and applicable guidelines. This subsection 159 does not apply to wanton, willful, reckless, or intentional 160 misconduct.

161 (k) This section does not apply to either of the 162 following:

163 (1) Any health care facility designated for psychiatric164 care, including a psychiatric hospital.

165 (2) Any unit, ward, floor, wing, or other area of any
166 health care facility which is designated for psychiatric care.
167 Section 3. Sections 22-21-430 through 22-21-436, Code

168 of Alabama 1975, relating to hospital visitation during a



169 public health emergency, are repealed.

170 Section 4. This act shall become effective immediately

171 following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its

172 otherwise becoming law.
