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4	SJR RECOGNIZING THE ALABMA RIVER AS AN ALABAMA STATE
5	LANDMARK ON RIVERS OF ALABAMA DAY ON APRIL 11, 2023.
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7	WHEREAS, Alabama is blessed with more than 132,000
8	miles of rivers and streams and is well-known for its
9	high-quality waters, which are the most biologically diverse
10	freshwaters in the entire United States, with 20 fish
11	species found nowhere else in the world; and
12	WHEREAS, the Alabama River, flowing through Elmore,
13	Autauga, Montgomery, Lowndes, Dallas, Wilcox, Monroe,
14	Baldwin and Clarke Counties, contributes to over 300 miles
15	in Alabama's river system; the Alabama River flows
16	exclusively in the East Gulf Coastal Plain Section and
17	touches six districts including the Fall Line Hills,
18	Black Belt, Chunnenuggee Hills, Southern Red Hills, Lime
19	Hills, and the Southern Pine Hills; and
20	WHEREAS, the Alabama River is an iconic cornerstone of
21	Alabama's natural heritage; the system hosts more species of

fish, mussels, turtles, and birds than most states and
countries; historically, striped bass migrations on the
Alabama River indicated the beginning of the yearly fishing
season; large numbers of Alabama shad spawned in the river

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26	and were a nost for freshwater mussel reproduction which in
27	turn cleaned the waters of the state; mullet used the river
28	as a place to feed and grow and communities held
29	celebrations during their migrations; the Alabama River was
30	prime spawning habitat for Gulf and Alabama sturgeon while
31	American eels migrated up the river from their spawning
32	grounds in the Sargasso Sea to mature in the river through
33	their life stages and were also consumed by other important
3 4	coastal and marine species; and
35	WHEREAS, the Alabama River has played an important role
36	in the cultural history of the United States; ancestors from
37	the Creek Nation, including the Poarch Creek Indians and the
38	Alabama-Coushattas, lived along the banks of the Alabama
39	River, using them for trade routes and for sources of food
10	and water; it was one of the key rivers in the American
11	Civil War, as Union Forces used it to transport troops and
12	supplies, and Confederate Forces fought to deny access from
13	Mobile Bay; in the 20th Century, the river was a major
14	transportation route for the industrialization of the
15	southern United States; and
16	WHEREAS, the Alabama River offers vast opportunities
17	for water-related recreation; the Mobile Delta formed by the
18	Alabama and Tombigbee Rivers is universally known for its
19	hunting, fishing, canoeing, and birdwatching opportunities;
50	Claiborne Lake encompasses over 60 miles of the Alabama



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51	River and offers excellent fishing for largemouth bass,
52	crappie, bluegill, and catfish; the William "Bill" Dannelly
53	Reservoir, located in Alabama's Blackbelt, hosts nearly
54	three million visitors per year with its offerings of
55	fishing, skiing, boating, and hunting, and Woodruff Lake
56	offers such activities as fishing, boating, water-skiing,
57	picnicking, camping, swimming, and hiking, and has an annual
58	attendance of over two million visitors each year; now
59	therefore,
60	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
61	HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That on April 11, 2023, Rivers of
62	Alabama Day, the Alabama River is herein recognized as an
63	Alabama State Landmark for its natural and cultural
64	significance to the people of Alabama, the nation, and the
65	world, and it is directed that a copy of this resolution be
66	provided for appropriate display during this celebrated
67	event.
