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4 SYNOPSIS:

5 Under existing law, local boards of education 6 and sports organizations are not required to adhere to 7 any protocol if a student athlete exhibits symptoms of 8 sudden cardiac arrest.

9 This bill would create the Tyrell Spencer Act 10 and would require the State Board of Education to adopt 11 certain guidelines to inform and educate student 12 athletes, parents, and coaches about the signs and 13 symptoms of sudden cardiac arrest.

14This bill would require each student athlete and15his or her parent or guardian to provide written16acknowledgment of receipt of information about sudden17cardiac arrest before the student athlete may18participate in any athletic activity.

19 This bill would allow for the removal of a 20 student athlete who exhibits symptoms of sudden cardiac 21 arrest from an athletic activity, and would prohibit 22 the student athlete from returning to the athletic 23 activity until a licensed physician provides written 24 clearance for his or her return.

This bill would require each coach of an athletic activity to receive training relating to sudden cardiac arrest every two years provided by the Alabama High School Athletic Association and Alabama



29 Independent School Association and approved by the 30 State Board of Education, and would require the 31 training to be coordinated with existing training 32 relating to CPR and automated external defibrillators 33 (AEDs). 34 This bill would prohibit a coach from coaching until the training is complete. 35 36 This bill would also encourage the availability 37 of an AED near all athletic activities. 38 39 40 41 A BILL 42 TO BE ENTITLED 43 AN ACT 44 45 Relating to K-12 school sports; to create the Tyrell 46 Spencer Act; to require coaches to undergo training and follow 47 all health and safety guidelines related to sudden cardiac 48 arrest; to require the training to be coordinated with 49 existing training requirements related to CPR and automated 50 external defibrillators (AEDs); to require the State Board of 51 Education to approve training requirements and adopt 52 guidelines and information sheets regarding sudden cardiac 53 arrest and distribute those information sheets to student 54 athletes, parents, and coaches; to authorize the Alabama High 55 School Athletic Association and the Alabama Independent School 56 Association to provide the training; to allow for the removal



57 from play of student athletes who exhibit symptoms of sudden 58 cardiac arrest; to require student athletes and parents to acknowledge receipt of informational materials related to 59 60 sudden cardiac arrest; and to encourage AED availability. 61 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as 62 63 the Tyrell Spencer Act. 64 Section 2. For the purposes of this act, the following 65 terms have the following meanings: (1) AHSAA. The Alabama High School Athletic 66 67 Association. (2) AISA. The Alabama Independent School Association. 68 69 (3) ATHLETIC ACTIVITY. a. This term includes any of the following activities: 70 71 1. Interscholastic athletics at any school. 2. Any athletic contest or competition other than 72 73 interscholastic athletics that is sponsored by or associated 74 with a school, including club-sponsored sports activities. 75 3. Competitive or noncompetitive cheerleading that is 76 sponsored by or associated with a school. 77 4. Any practices, including interscholastic practices 78 or scrimmages for any activities listed in this subdivision. 79 b. This term does not include any recreational sports 80 activity that is not associated with a school, including a 81 city or county recreational youth sports league. 82 (4) BOARD. The State Board of Education. (5) SCHOOL. Any public or private K-12 school. 83 84 (6) STUDENT ATHLETE. A student who is enrolled in a



85 K-12 school and participates in any athletic activity.

86 Section 3. (a) The board shall adopt guidelines to 87 inform and educate student athletes, parents, and coaches 88 about the nature and warning signs of sudden cardiac arrest, 89 including the risks associated with continuing to participate 90 in or practice an athletic activity after experiencing 91 symptoms, as outlined by the required training.

92 (b) The board shall develop a cardiac arrest symptoms 93 and warning signs information sheet to be provided to each student athlete participating in an athletic activity. 94 95 Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year, before any student athlete may participate in any athletic activity, the student 96 97 athlete and his or her parent or guardian shall sign and return to the student athlete's school an acknowledgement form 98 99 acknowledging their receipt and review of the information sheet. The acknowledgment form shall be developed by the AHSAA 100 for its member schools and the AISA for its member schools. As 101 102 part of the student athlete's eligibility requirements, a new 103 acknowledgment form shall be signed and returned to the 104 applicable school at the beginning of each school year in 105 which the student athlete intends to participate in an 106 athletic activity. Each acknowledgment form shall be kept in 107 the school's online eligibility software program.

(c) In developing guidelines and materials, the board may use educational materials created by Simon's Heart for the purpose of educating student athletes, parents, and coaches about sudden cardiac arrest.

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(d) The board, the AHSAA, and the AISA shall post any



guidelines or materials developed pursuant to this act on the publicly accessible website of the entity.

115 Section 4. Each local board of education may hold an 116 informational meeting for student athletes, parents, coaches, 117 and other school officials prior to the start of each athletic 118 season regarding the symptoms and warning signs of sudden 119 cardiac arrest. Informational meetings may include, but are 120 not limited to, presentations from physicians, pediatric 121 cardiologists, and athletic trainers.

122 Section 5. (a) (1) Beginning with the 2024-2025 school 123 year, once every two years, each coach of any athletic activity shall complete a cardiac arrest training course 124 125 provided by the AHSAA for its member schools and by the AISA 126 for its member schools. The training shall be approved by the 127 board, and, if the board chooses, may include the course produced by Simon's Heart and made available through the 128 129 National Federation of State High School Associations.

130 (2) The training shall be in correlation with any other 131 training required by the relevant school association related 132 to cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and automated external 133 defibrillators (AEDs).

(b) A coach of any athletic activity may not be eligible to coach in any practice or competition until he or she has completed the training course required under this section.

Section 6. (a) An athletic trainer, coach, or other responsible party may remove any student athlete who, during any athletic activity, exhibits any symptoms identifiable by



141 the required training if the trainer, coach, or other responsible party reasonably believes that the student 142 143 athlete's symptoms are cardiac related. If a student athlete 144 is removed from an athletic activity for the reason described 145 in this subsection, an athletic trainer, coach, or other responsible party who observed the student athlete exhibit the 146 147 symptoms shall attempt to notify the student athlete's parent 148 or quardian of those symptoms.

(b) A student athlete who is removed from participation in an athletic activity pursuant to this section may not be permitted to return to play until he or she has been evaluated by a licensed physician and receives written clearance to return to play from the licensed physician.

154 Section 7. The sponsors of recreational youth athletic 155 activities are encouraged, but not required, to follow the 156 guidelines provided in this act.

157 Section 8. The Legislature encourages the availability 158 of an automated external defibrillator (AED) within three 159 minutes retrieval time at any athletic activity.

160 Section 9. This act shall become effective on the first 161 day of the third month following its passage and approval by 162 the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
