

House Judiciary Reported Substitute for HB174

8	AN ACT
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10	Relating to crimes and offenses; to amend Section
11	13A-11-61, Code of Alabama 1975; to further provide for the
12	crime of discharging a firearm in certain circumstances; to
13	make nonsubstantive, technical revisions to update the
14	existing code language to current style; and in connection
15	therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement
16	of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the
17	meaning of Section 111.05 of the Constitution of Alabama of
18	2022.
19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
20	Section 1. Section 13A-11-61, Code of Alabama 1975, is
21	amended to read as follows:
22	"§13A-11-61
23	(a) No person shall shoot or discharge a firearm,
24	explosive, or other weapon which that discharges a dangerous
25	projectile into any occupied or unoccupied dwelling $-\frac{or}{L}$
26	building or, railroad locomotive or, railroad car, aircraft,
27	automobile, truck, or watercraft in this state.
28	(b) Any person who commits an act prohibited by



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subsection (a) with respect to an occupied dwelling or,
building or, railroad locomotive or, railroad car, aircraft,
automobile, truck <u>,</u> or watercraft shall be deemed guilty of a
Class B-A felony-as defined by the state criminal code, and
upon conviction, shall be punished as prescribed by law.
(c) Any person who commits any an act prohibited by
subsection (a) hereof with respect to an unoccupied dwelling
or, building or, railroad locomotive or, railroad car,
aircraft, automobile, truck $_{\underline{\prime}}$ or watercraft shall be $\frac{\text{deemed}}{\text{deemed}}$
guilty of a Class C felony as defined by the state criminal
code, and upon conviction, shall be punished as prescribed by
law ."
Section 2. Although this bill would have as its purpose
or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of
local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements
and application under Section 111.05 of the Constitution of
Alabama of 2022, because the bill defines a new crime or
amends the definition of an existing crime.
Section 3. This act shall become effective on October
1, 2024.
