21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
22	Section 1. Sections 34-31-18, 34-31-24, 34-31-25,
23	34-31-28, 34-31-30, 34-31-32, and 34-31-34, Code of Alabama

50	CONTRACTOR. Any and all legal entities person engaged in the
51	business of heating and air conditioning contracting and
52	installation or service and repair.
53	(6)(5) CERTIFIED REFRIGERATION CONTRACTOR. Any and all
54	legal entities person engaged in the business of refrigeration
55	contracting and servicing, installation, and repair.
56	(7) (6) DUCT AIR TIGHTNESS TESTING CONTRACTOR. Any

81	(12) REGULARLY EMPLOYED PERSON. A personAn individual
82	who is meets all of the following conditions:
83	a. Is an actual employee of the business, not an

84 independent contractor. The person must work



85 b. Works an average of 30 or more hours per week for 86 the heating, air conditioning, or refrigeration business.

87 c. Is A regularly employed person must not be paid as

88 an independent contractor.

89 d. and must receive Receives a Form W-2, Wage and Tax 90 Statement, for all earnings.

91 (13) RESPONSIBLE CHARGE. The direction of projects 92 involving the installation or service and repair of heating, 93 air conditioning, and refrigeration systems requiring initiation, professional skills, technical knowledge, and 94 95 independent judgment.

(14) SERVICE AND REPAIR. The act of maintaining for 96 operation a heating, air conditioning, or refrigeration system 97 98 which that has previously been installed, including parts 99 replacement within a piece of equipment."

101 (a) (1) No individual, partnership, or corporation shall 102 person may advertise, solicit, bid, obtain permitpermits, do 103 business, or perform the function of a certified contractor 104 unless the person or persons in responsible charge, as defined 105 in Section 34-31-18, are is a certified contractorscontractor.

106 (2) Every contractor licensed under this chapter shall display the contractor's certification number and the company 107 108 name on any and all documentation, forms of advertising, and 109 on all service and installation vehicles used in conjunction with heating, air conditioning, and refrigeration contracting. 110

(3) A contractor licensed under this chapter may not 111 112 permit the use of his or her license by any other



113 personsperson.

114 (4) No official charged with the duty of issuing who 115 issues licenses to any individual, partnership, or corporation 116 person to operate a business as a certified contractor shall 117 may issue sucha license unless there is presented for 118 inspection a certificate of qualification as provided for 119 herein issued by the board to the individual or to some the 120 person in responsible charge with the partnership or 121 corporation.

(b) The following requirements apply to the practice oftesting or verifying duct air tightness:

(1) Any individual who engages in the practice of 124 125 testing and verifying duct air tightness is required to register with the board. Such The individuals shall not be are 126 127 not required to become a certified heating and air conditioning contractor, but shall complete training as set 128 forth by this subsection. The board shall maintain a list of 129 130 individuals who are registered duct envelope testing 131 contractors in the practice of testing and verifying duct air 132 tightness and leakage. The board may establish fees to be paid 133 by registrants. All fees must accompany the application for 134 registration and are nonrefundable. All registrations must be 135 renewed by December 31 of each year beginning in 2016. The 136 board may establish a late fee for those individuals failing 137 to renew by December 31.

(2) Any board certified heating and air conditioning
contractor, or home builder licensed by the Alabama Home
Builders Licensure Board, seeking to register as a duct



141 tightness tester for the purposes of testing ducts on his or 142 her own project or on a third party basis for the general 143 public, must successfully complete the Residential Energy 144 Services Network Home Energy Rating Systems (HERS) Rater 145 training, the Building Performance Institute Building Analyst 146 (BPI) training, or the Home Builders Association of Alabama 147 Qualified Credentialed Air Tightness Verifier (QCATV) 148 training. Any applicant that is not a board certified 149 contractor or a licensed home builder seeking to register as a duct tightness tester for the purposes of testing duct work on 150 151 a third party basis for the general public, must successfully complete the Residential Energy Services Network Home Energy 152 153 Rating System (HERS) Rater training or the Building 154 Performance Institute Building Analyst (BPI) training. Each 155 applicant must submit verification that he or she has successfully completed the training required by at least one 156 157 of the above listed programs to the board prior to receiving 158 the registration in order to be added to the list of 159 registered individuals. Each registrant must submit proof of 160 completion, approved by the Home Builders Association of 161 Alabama, prior to annual re-registration by the board.

162 (3) The board may discipline any registrant who fails 163 to conduct air tightness testing to the standards set forth by 164 the board. Discipline for registrants may include any and all 165 penalties authorized by this chapter."

167 (a) (1) For the purpose of defraying the expense in
 168 carrying out the provisions of this chapter, the board may fix



169 fees to be paid for the issuance, reissuance, and replacement 170 of certificates, and for any other service provided by the 171 board, but in no event shall the charges fixed by the board 172 exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250). The inactive fees may be waived for building officials or inspectors, as defined by 173 174 the International Code Council. All fees fixed by the board 175 must accompany the application, and no part of the fees shall 176 be refunded. The fees shall be received by the board and held solely for the purpose of paying the expense of carrying out 177 the provisions of this chapter. 178

(2) Renewal fees shall be established by the board as

(a) All prospective certified contractors in this state
 desiringseeking to qualify in accordance with the provisions
 of this chapter shall be required to stand for a written

Any applicant failing to pass 198 his or her first examination for a certificate shall be 199 entitled tomay take any subsequent examination, either written 200 or, upon request of the applicant, <u>a practical examination</u> 201 which is equivalent to the written examination, to be held 202 within six months from the date of his or her<u>first or latest</u> 203 unsuccessful examination.

204 (b) The board shall register every person who may apply 205 for an apprentice heating, air conditioning, or refrigeration 206 registration certificate upon forms provided by the board and 207 upon payment of all prescribed fees.

208 (c) (b) The board shall examine the character, fitness, 209 and qualifications of every <u>personindividual</u> who applies for a 210 certified heating, air conditioning, or refrigeration 211 contractor license upon forms prescribed by the board and upon 212 payment of all prescribed fees.

213 (d) (c) An applicant for examination for a heating, air 214 conditioning, or refrigeration certified contractor license 215 shall be eligible to stand for the examination if the 216 applicant has held an apprentice registration, issued by this 217 board, for two or more calendar years; or has completed 3,000 218 hours of coursework orwork experience, as defined by the 219 board +, or is a graduate of an approved heating, air 220 conditioning, or refrigeration curriculum.

(c) All legal entities engaged in the refrigeration business for a period of two years prior to May 13, 2009, may apply to the board for a certified refrigeration contractor license without standing for a written examination. The



applicant shall provide evidence of such experience to the 225 226 board as promulgated in the rules of the board. An applicant 227 who does not apply for such certification by December 31, 2011, must stand for the written examination. 228 229 (f) (d) Counties, municipalities, or other local 230 entities are hereby prohibited from requiring any further 231 local testing or satisfaction of other requirements of by 232 certified contractors, subject to the payment of any 233 applicable local privilege, license, or business fees or 234 charges. 235 (g) (e) PersonsIndividuals licensed by the Alabama 236 Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board are exempt from this chapter 237 pertaining to heating, air conditioning, and refrigeration 238 when: 239 (1) Engaged in the installation, repair, or replacement 240 of a liquefied petroleum gas appliance so long as the 241 appliance is not connected to a refrigeration system, -except provided that such persons the individuals may also engage in 242 243 the replacement or repair of a liquefied petroleum gas central 244 heating unit when it is combined with an air conditioning 245 unit. 246 (2) Engaged in the installation of a venting system 247 required for a vented-type liquefied petroleum gas appliance.

248 (h) (f) This chapter does not apply to any of the 249 following:

(1) An authorized employee of the United States, the
State of Alabama this state, or any municipality, county, or
other political subdivision, if the employee does not hold



253 himself or herself out for hire or otherwise engage in 254 contracting except in accordance with his or her employment.

(2) Any mobile home or manufactured structure that is installed, inspected, or regulated by the Alabama Manufactured Housing Commission; however, the repair, servicing of a heating and air conditioning system, or the installation of a new heating and air conditioning system in a previously inspected manufactured structure is subject to this chapter.

The board may require a performance bond in the amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) not to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per year for all active certified contractors. There shall be no discrimination between contractors similarly situated, and each classification of regulated contractors for bonding purposes must be reasonable in light of considering the purpose of the bond."

(a) Except as provided in Section 13A-9-111.1, any
 personindividual engaged in business as a certified contractor
 or performing the functions of a certified contractor in
 violation of this chapter shall be guilty of a Class A



281 misdemeanor, as defined by the state criminal code.

282 (b) The board may impose late penalties on those 283 certified contractors who fail to renew certificates by 284 December 31 of each year. The board may also remove the 285 certification from any certified personindividual who fails to 286 renew his or her certificate by the first day of March and 287 require the person individual to apply for a new certificate. 288 Furthermore, the board may remove, revoke, or suspend the 289 certification from any certified contractor who provides 290 substandard or dangerous service, repair, or installation, or 291 who otherwise violates this chapter, and may require such person to apply for a new certification. The board may also 292 293 require the successful re-testing of any such previously 294 certified personindividual who applies for a new 295 certification.

(c) The board may reprimand, in writing, any certified
contractor who provides substandard or dangerous service,
repair, or installation, or who otherwise violates this
chapter.

300 <u>(d) The board may remove, revoke, or suspend the</u> 301 <u>certification of any certified contractor who provides</u> 302 <u>substandard or dangerous service, repair, or installation, or</u> 303 <u>who otherwise violates this chapter, and may require any</u> 304 <u>previously certified individual to apply for a new</u> 305 <u>certification.</u>

306 (d) (e) The board may levy and collect administrative
307 fines for serious violations of this chapter or the rules of
308 the board of not more than two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for



309 each violation.

310 (c) (f) (1) In addition to or in lieu of the criminal 311 penalties and administrative sanctions provided in this 312 chapter, the board may issue an order to any person, firm, or 313 corporation engaged in any activity, conduct, or practice constituting that is a violation of this chapter, directing 314 315 the person, firm, or corporation to cease and desist from the 316 activity, conduct, practice, or performance of any work then 317 being donein progress or about to be commenced. The order shall be issued in the name of the State of Alabama this state 318 319 under the authority of the board.

320 (2) If the person, firm, or corporation fails to immediately comply with the whom the board directs a cease and 321 322 desist order, does not cease or desist the proscribed activity, conduct, practice, or performance of work 323 immediately, the board shall cause to issue in petition any 324 325 court of competent jurisdiction and proper venue, to issue a 326 writ of injunction enjoining the person, firm, or corporation 327 from engaging in any activity, conduct, practice, or 328 performance of work prohibited by this chapter. Upon a 329 sufficient showing by the board that the person, firm, or 330 corporation has engaged or is engaged in any activity, 331 conduct, practice, or performance of work prohibited by this 332 chapter, the courtscourt shallmay issue a temporary 333 restraining order restraining to enjoin the person, firm, or 334 corporation from engaging in such unlawful activity, conduct, practice, or the performance of work pending the hearing on a 335 336 preliminary injunction, and in due course. After a hearing,



337 <u>the court may issue</u> a permanent injunction shall issue after 338 <u>the hearing</u>, commanding the cessation of the <u>unlawful</u> 339 <u>activity</u>, <u>conduct</u>, <u>practice</u>, <u>or</u> performance of work complained 340 of, all without the necessity of the board having to give 341 bond. (4) Any failure to cease work, after a hearing and 348 notification from the board, shall not be eligible render an 349 350 individual ineligible to apply for a certified contractor's 351 license for a period not to exceed one year from the date of official notification to cease work. The board may withhold 352 353 approval, for up to six months, of any application from 354 anyoneany individual who, prior to the application, has been 355 found in violation of this chapter."
