5	This bill would designate the Alabama shad as
6	the official state migratory fish of Alabama.

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13	Relating to state symbols; to designate the Alabama
14	shad as the official state migratory fish.
15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
16	Section 1. The Legislature finds and declares the
17	following:
18	(a) Alosa alabamae, commonly known as the Alabama shad,
19	is a clupeid fish native to the eastern United States and is
20	found in medium and large river systems along the Gulf Coast
21	from the Mississippi River to the Suwannee River.
22	(b) The Alabama shad was discovered in the Black
23	Warrior River near Tuscaloosa in the late 18th Century and was
24	historically present in the Mobile, Tombigbee, Alabama, Black
25	Warrior, Cahaba, and Tennessee River Watersheds.
26	(c) The life cycle of the Alabama shad takes the fish
27	from riverine to marine habitats and back again. The Alabama
28	shad emerge in medium and large rivers, make the downstream

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- journey to marine habitats to feed and mature, and return to
- 30 the river where they were spawned.
- 31 (d) The Alabama shad play a unique role in aquatic 32 ecosystems, transferring nutrients and biomass from saltwater 33 to freshwater during their life cycle.
- (e) The Alabama shad act as host fish for numerous
 freshwater mussels, allowing these mussels to complete their
 life cycles, find new habitats, and provide critically
 important ecosystem services like water filtration and
 nutrient storage. Specifically, the Alabama shad is a host
 fish for Elliptic crassidens, commonly known as the
 elephant-ear mussel.
- (f) Because of an inability to pass above instream

 obstacles, the Alabama shad has been extirpated from much of

 its habitat in Alabama and elsewhere. This extirpation also

 threatens the survival of the elephant-ear mussel in the

 Cahaba River.
- 46 (g) Efforts to reconnect the Alabama shad with its
 47 habitat and improve its habitat through fish-passage
 48 infrastructure and beneficial stewardship practices align with
 49 existing aquatic restoration initiatives to promote the health
 50 of other migratory fish, freshwater mussels, and Alabama
 51 freshwater and marine ecosystems.
- Section 2. The Alabama shad, *Alosa alabamae*, is hereby designated and named the official state migratory fish of Alabama.
- Section 3. This act shall become effective on October 1, 2024.
