SYNOPSIS:

5 The Physical Therapy Practice Act defines the 6 scope of practice of physical therapists licensed in 7 Alabama.

This bill would allow licensed physical therapists to conduct initial screenings of patients.

This bill would eliminate the requirement that physical therapy be practiced only upon a referral from a licensed physician, licensed dentist, licensed chiropractor, licensed physician assistant, or licensed certified registered nurse practitioner.

A BILL

TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

Relating to the practice of physical therapy; to amend Sections 34-24-191 and 34-24-210.1, Code of Alabama 1975, to allow licensed physical therapists to conduct initial screenings of patients and to eliminate the requirement that physical therapy be practiced only upon a referral from a licensed physician, licensed dentist, licensed chiropractor, licensed physician assistant, or licensed certified registered nurse practitioner.



- 29 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
- 30 Section 1. Section 34-24-191, Code of Alabama 1975, is
- 31 amended to read as follows:

- 33 (a) For the purposes of this article, the following
- 34 words and phrases shall terms have the following meanings
- 35 respectively ascribed by this section:
- 36 (1) BOARD. The Board of Physical Therapy established by
- 37 Section 34-24-192.
- 38 (2) COMMISSION. The Physical Therapy Compact
- 39 Commission, the national administrative body whose membership
- 40 consists of all states that have enacted the interstate
- 41 compact.
- 42 (3) COMPACT PRIVILEGE. The authorization granted by a
- 43 remote state to allow a licensee from another state to
- 44 practice as a physical therapist or work as a physical
- 45 therapist assistant in the remote state under its laws and
- 46 rules. The practice of physical therapy occurs in the state
- 47 where the patient/client is located at the time of the
- 48 patient/client encounter.
- 49 (4) COMPACT PRIVILEGE HOLDER. An individual licensed as
- 50 a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant in a
- 51 compact state who has been granted a compact privilege by the
- 52 commission.
- 53 (5) FOREIGN EDUCATED PHYSICAL THERAPIST. A person
- 54 trained or educated in the practice of physical therapy
- outside of the United States or any of its territorial
- 56 possessions.

(6) IMPAIRED. The inability of a physical therapy licensee to practice physical therapy with reasonable skill and safety to patients by reason of illness, inebriation, excessive use of drugs, narcotics, alcohol, chemicals, or other substances, or as a result of any physical or mental condition.

- 63 (7) PHYSICAL THERAPIST. A person who practices physical therapy.
 - (8) PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT. A person who assists in the practice of physical therapy and whose activities require an understanding of physical therapy but do not require professional or advanced training in the anatomical, biological, and physical sciences involved in the practice of physical therapy. The physical therapist assistant shall practice only under the direction of a licensed physical therapist.
 - (9) PHYSICAL THERAPY. The treatment of a human being by the use of exercise, massage, heat, cold, water, radiant energy, electricity, or sound for the purpose of correcting or alleviating any physical or mental condition or preventing the development of any physical or mental disability, or the performance of neuromuscular-skeletal tests and measurements to determine the existence and extent of body malfunction; provided, that physical therapy shall be practiced only upon the referral of a physician licensed to practice medicine or surgery, a dentist licensed to practice dentistry, a licensed chiropractor, a licensed assistant to a physician acting pursuant to a valid supervisory agreement, or a licensed

- 86 practice agreement with a licensed physician, except as
- 87 otherwise provided in this chapter. Physical therapy does not
- 88 include radiology or electrosurgery.
- 89 (10) PHYSICAL THERAPY AIDE. A person trained under the
- 90 direction of a physical therapist who performs designated and
- 91 supervised routine tasks related to physical therapy services.
- 92 (11) PHYSICAL THERAPY LICENSEE. A physical therapist or
- 93 physical therapist assistant who is licensed under this
- 94 article.
- 95 (12) PHYSIOTHERAPIST. Synonymous with the term
- 96 "physical therapist," and the term shall be used to identify
- 97 only those persons licensed under this article. The physical
- 98 therapist may use the letters "P.T." or "R.P.T." in connection
- 99 with his or her name or place of business to denote his or her
- 100 registration hereunder.
- 101 (13) RESTRICTED LICENSE.
- a. For a physical therapist, a license on which the
- 103 board has placed restrictions or conditions, or both, as to
- 104 the scope of practice, place of practice, supervision of
- 105 practice, duration of licensed status, or type or condition of
- 106 patient to whom the physical therapist may provide services.
- b. For a physical therapist assistant, a license on
- 108 which the board has placed any restriction.
- 109 (b) Words importing the masculine gender shall include
- 110 the feminine."
- 111 Section 2. Section 34-24-210.1, Code of Alabama 1975,
- is amended to read as follows:

114	(a) Without prescription or referral, a licensed
115	physical therapist or compact privilege holder may perform an
116	initial evaluation or consultation of a screening nature to
117	determine the need for physical therapy and may perform the
118	physical therapy and other services provided in subdivisions
119	(b)(1) through (5). Implementation of physical therapy shall
120	otherwise be based on the referral of a person licensed to
121	practice medicine, surgery, dentistry, chiropractic, licensed
122	assistant to a physician acting pursuant to a valid
123	supervising agreement, or a licensed certified registered
124	nurse practitioner in a valid collaborative practice agreement
125	with a licensed physician.
126	(b) The physical therapy and other services referred to
127	in subsection (a), which may be performed without prescription
128	or referral, include and are limited to the following:
129	(1) To a child with a diagnosed developmental
130	disability pursuant to the plan of care for the child.
131	(2) To a patient of a home health care agency pursuant
132	to the plan of care for the patient.
133	(3) To a patient in a nursing home pursuant to the plan
134	of care for the patient.
135	(4) Related to conditioning or to providing education
136	or activities in a wellness setting for the purpose of injury
137	prevention, reduction of stress, or promotion of fitness.
138	(5) To an individual for a previously diagnosed
139	condition or conditions for which physical therapy services
140	are appropriate after informing the health care provider



141	rendering the diagnosis. The diagnosis shall have been made
142	within the immediately preceding 90 days. The physical
143	therapist shall provide the health care provider who rendered
144	the diagnosis with a plan of care for physical therapy
145	services within the first 15 days of physical therapy
146	intervention. A licensed physical therapist may perform an
147	initial evaluation or consultation of a screening nature to
148	determine the need for physical therapy, establish a plan of
149	care, and initiate physical therapy services as appropriate.
150	The physical therapist shall refer patients to other providers
151	as needed. If a referral is received, a plan of care will be
152	sent to the referring provider."
153	Section 3. This act shall become effective on October
154	1, 2024.
