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4	SJR ENCOURAGING ACCESS TO COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING
5	FOR ALL ALABAMIANS ON MEDICAID.
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7	WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is the second leading
8	cause of cancer death among men and women combined in the
9	United States; however, it is one of the most highly
10	preventable forms of cancer; and
11	WHEREAS, screening tests can detect colorectal cancer
12	early, which is when treatment works best; patients with
13	colorectal cancer diagnosed when it is in the early stages
14	have a five-year survival rate of 91 percent, but patients
15	with colorectal cancer diagnosed when it is already
16	metastatic have a five-year survival rate of 14 percent; and
17	WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society estimates that
18	2,750 Alabamians will be diagnosed with colorectal cancer in
19	2024; the American Cancer Society also estimates 900 deaths
20	due to colorectal cancer in Alabama in 2024; and
21	WHEREAS, roughly one in three Alabamians over 45
22	years of age is currently not getting screened for
23	colorectal cancer; and
24	WHEREAS, deaths from colorectal cancer occur
25	disproportionately among those who are underserved; and
26	WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society and the U.S.
27	Preventive Services Task Force's recommendations for
28	colorectal cancer screening include colonoscopy, CT

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29	colonography, flexible sigmoidoscopy, sDNA-FIT, and FIT/FOB
30	tests; and
31	WHEREAS, patients may be more or less likely to
32	utilize specific screening modalities based on fear,
33	education, medical consultation, geographic location, bias,
34	personal preference, or other reasons; and
35	WHEREAS, prevention, screening, early detection, and
36	improving the health of people with cancer can save lives
37	and reduce total health care costs; and
38	WHEREAS, Alabama law requires all state-regulated
39	health plans to cover colorectal cancer screening tests in
40	accordance with American Cancer Society guidelines; now
41	therefore,
42	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
43	HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we recognize the importance
44	of colorectal cancer screening; having access to all
45	modalities of colorectal cancer screenings will encourage
46	patients' compliant participation in the screenings.
47	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we encourage the Alabama
48	Medicaid program to provide equal access to colorectal
49	cancer screening for Alabamians who are 45 years of age and
50	older and to cover all available ACS and USPSTF recommended
51	options for colorectal cancer screening, consistent with
52	other state-regulated plans.
