20	To make appropriations for the ordinary expenses of
21	the executive, legislative, and judicial agencies of the
22	State, for other functions of government, for debt service,
23	and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September
24	30, 2023.
25	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
26	Section 1. The monies in Section 2 are appropriated
27	from the named funds for the 2023 fiscal year to the state

agencies indicated, as the amounts to be used to pay the expenditures of the named agencies, and are in lieu of all monies appropriated for these purposes in other sections of the Alabama Statutes.

5 For the purpose of this act, the amounts herein for 6 expenditures are listed by programmatic area and the totals 7 for all programs are shown by the source of funds. It is 8 intended that only the herein named funds be appropriated in 9 the amounts specified to the named agencies and that the 10 following definitions shall be applicable.

11 "Appropriation Total" shall mean the aggregate total12 of all funding sources.

"Program" shall mean specific governmental services required to achieve a specific objective. A program shall be directed to meeting the need of an identified clientele, or group of recipients or beneficiaries, and shall be expended only for such purposes.

18 "Capital Outlay" shall mean expenditures which 19 result in the acquisition and/or addition to items, such as 20 land or buildings, which have an appreciable and calculable 21 period of usefulness in excess of one year, and shall be 22 expended only for such purposes.

"Debt Service" shall mean an expenditure for the
payment of interest and principal on bonded debt obligations
of the State, and shall be expended only for such purposes.

"Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts,
 grants, contributions, or entitlements, including grants by
 the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated the amounts 4 5 set forth herein for the ordinary expenses of the executive, 6 legislative, and judicial agencies of the State, for other 7 functions of government, for debt service, and for capital outlay for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, to be 8 9 paid out of any monies hereinafter specified, from such other 10 funds and accounts as may be designated, or so much thereof as may be necessary, and the total amount to be expended for the 11 items for which the appropriation is herein made shall not 12 13 exceed the amount provided therefor, except as provided in the 14 Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections 41-19-1 through 15 41-19-12, Code of Alabama 1975. Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any pay period which has been 16 17 or may be established by the Legislature for the payment of 18 salaries of state employees, the entire payment due shall be 19 made from the fiscal year's appropriation in which the pay 20 date falls.

15 Section 3. In addition to the amounts otherwise 16 appropriated in this act, there is hereby appropriated from 17 the several funds in the State Treasury, except the Education 18 Trust Fund, and in the same proportion as the salaries of the 19 several State officials and employees are paid, such 20 additional amounts as may be necessary to pay for a four 21 percent (4.0%) salary increase enacted in the 2022 Regular 22 Session. The additional amounts appropriated in this section 23 from the State General Fund shall not exceed \$28,000,000 for 24 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. The Director of 25 Finance shall ensure that first priority shall be given to all 26 State General Fund payrolls, including the payroll of the Legislature. State agencies shall receive additional 27 28 allocations from the appropriation made in this section from 29 the State General Fund in amounts necessary to increase total

salaries paid from the State General Fund by four percent. The
 remainder of this appropriation from the State General Fund
 may be allotted by the Director of Finance to those agencies
 which receive transfers from the State General Fund.

5 Section 4. In addition to the amounts otherwise 6 appropriated in this act, there is hereby appropriated from the several funds in the State Treasury, except the Education 7 Trust Fund, and in the same proportion as the salaries of the 8 several State Officials and employees are paid, such 9 10 additional amounts as may be necessary to pay for a one-time 11 bonus for certain retirees of the Employees' Retirement System enacted in the 2022 Regular Session. The additional amounts 12 13 appropriated in this section from the State General Fund shall not exceed \$4,800,000 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 14 15 2023. The Director of Finance shall ensure that first priority 16 shall be given to all State General Fund payrolls, including the payroll of the Legislature. State Agencies may receive 17 18 additional allocations from the appropriation made in this 19 section from the State General Fund in amounts necessary to 20 grant the bonus from the State General Fund. The remainder of 21 this appropriation from the State General Fund may be allotted 22 by the Director of Finance to those agencies which receive 23 transfers from the State General Fund. The funds appropriated 24 for the bonus in this section are conditioned upon the enactment of SB or HB during the 2022 Regular Session 25 26 authorizing such bonus.

1 Section 5. The State General Fund appropriations in 2 this act anticipate a beginning balance in the State General Fund for fiscal year 2023, excluding reversions and 3 adjustments, of \$140,583,142. If the State General Fund 4 5 beginning balance for Fiscal Year 2023, excluding reversions 6 and adjustments, is greater than the above stated anticipated amount, then the first \$3,000,000 of the unanticipated and 7 unappropriated beginning balance is hereby appropriated from 8 the State General Fund to the Legislative Services Agency for 9 expenses related to the completion, implementation, and 10 11 operation of the new bill and budget drafting system for the 12 Legislature. If after making the above appropriation, there 13 are still funds remaining above the stated amount, then the next \$3,500,000 of the unanticipated and unappropriated 14 15 beginning balance shall be appropriated from the State General 16 Fund to the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission to develop, implement, and maintain the Law 17 18 Enforcement Officer Employment Database required by Section 19 36-21-55.1, Code of Alabama 1975. If after making the above appropriation, there are still funds remaining above the 20 21 stated amount, then the next \$40,000,000 of the unanticipated 22 and unappropriated beginning balance is hereby appropriated 23 from the State General Fund to the Department of Corrections -24 Correctional Capital Improvement Fund established in Section 14-2-21(c), Code of Alabama 1975. If after making the above 25 26 appropriation, there are still remaining funds above the 27 stated anticipated amount, then the next \$10,000,000 of the

unanticipated and unappropriated beginning balance is hereby
 appropriated from the State General Fund and shall be
 transferred to the Correctional Facilities Maintenance Fund
 established in Section 14-2-21(d), Code of Alabama 1975.

5 Section 6. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 6 this act or any other act, any amounts from appropriations for 7 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, to the various 8 state agencies in this act which were unexpended and reverted 9 on September 30, 2022, are hereby reappropriated to the 10 respective offices for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 11 2022.

Section 7. In addition to all other appropriations heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated such amounts as may be necessary for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, to the Retirement Systems of Alabama from the Senior Services Trust Fund to comply with Section 41-15C-1, Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 8. In addition to all other appropriations 18 19 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby conditionally 20 appropriated any and all amounts from tobacco settlement or 21 litigation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. The 22 amounts are conditioned upon the State of Alabama receiving 23 revenue from tobacco settlement or litigation and upon the 24 recommendation of the Director of Finance, the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-General Fund Committee and the Senate 25 26 Finance and Taxation-General Fund Committee, and the approval 27 of the Governor. The conditional appropriation made herein

shall be allocated pursuant to Sections 41-10-620 through
 41-10-639 and Sections 41-15B-1 through 41-15B-8, Code of
 Alabama 1975.

Section 9. Except as may be herein otherwise 4 5 provided, amounts herein specifically appropriated shall be in 6 lieu of the amounts heretofore provided or appropriated by law 7 for such purposes. The amounts herein appropriated are the maximum amounts to be expended for the purposes herein 8 designated and in no event shall the maximum expenditure 9 10 provided for any items of expense exceed the amount allocated 11 herein except as may be further provided for under this act, 12 as provided in the Budget Management Act of 1976, Sections 13 41-19-1, et seq., Code of Alabama 1975, and those appropriations herein made, except appropriations to the 14 15 Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the purchase of 16 alcoholic beverages, are and shall be subject to the terms, conditions, provisions and limitations of Sections 41-4-80, et 17 18 seq., Code of Alabama 1975, and the Budget Management Act of 19 1976, Sections 41-19-1, et seq., Code of Alabama 1975.

20 Section 10. Any surplus remaining in any 21 appropriation herein made from the State General Fund to any 22 office, department, bureau, board, commission, or agency may 23 be transferred, on order of the Governor, to any other 24 appropriation herein made from the State General Fund when such appropriation to any office, department, bureau, board, 25 commission, or agency is insufficient to pay salaries in that 26 27 office, department, bureau, board, commission, or agency.

1 Section 11. (a) In addition to appropriations herein made, all gifts, grants, insurance proceeds, contributions, or 2 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 3 including grants by the Congress of the United States, 4 5 municipalities, or counties, to any department, division, 6 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office, or 7 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 8 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 9 institution, office, or officer to be used only for the 10 11 purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal, and 12 educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as 13 deemed necessary by mutual agreement among said entities, the 14 15 State of Alabama, and the Department of Examiners of Public 16 Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby 17 18 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department 19 of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be 20 expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22, 21 Code of Alabama 1975.

(b) Provided, however, this section shall not apply
to the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund or the
Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund provided by the Congress of
the United States to the State of Alabama from the American
Rescue Plan Act of 2021, except for any balance of such funds
remaining from any appropriations made for Fiscal Year 2022

1 that remain unspent at the end of Fiscal Year 2022 shall be reappropriated for the same purposes originally appropriated. 2 Any remaining Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds or 3 Coronavirus Capital Projects Funds shall be appropriated by 4 5 and through one or more independent supplemental appropriation 6 bills. Any amount of Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds 7 used to replace lost revenues shall be based upon estimates of lost revenues provided by the Director of Finance and the 8 Legislative Fiscal Officer and a plan approved by the 9 10 Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, President 11 Pro Tempore of the Senate, and the Chair of each budget 12 committee of the Alabama Legislature.

(c) This section shall also not apply to any
additional federal stimulus funds provided to the state in
Fiscal Year 2023 for purposes directly related to the
coronavirus pandemic, other than additional funds provided for
existing federal programs.

18 Section 12. The Department of Examiners of Public 19 Accounts is hereby authorized to examine as deemed necessary 20 all appropriations herein made for compliance with the laws of 21 the State of Alabama. Any examination performed shall be in 22 accordance with the provisions of Title 41, Chapter 5A, Code 23 of Alabama 1975. It is the intent of the Legislature that all 24 state agencies cooperate with the Examiners of Public Accounts to provide the information necessary to conduct recovery 25 26 audits as provided for in Section 41-5A-6, Code of Alabama 1975. 27

1 Section 13. Upon certification to the Director of Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 2 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 3 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 4 5 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 6 commission from the appropriate fund or funds of such 7 department, board, bureau, or commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court order. Such appropriations are 8 in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter 9 10 made in this appropriation act. Such appropriations are 11 conditioned upon the availability of funds and a determination 12 by the Director of Finance that existing appropriations are 13 not available for the court-ordered payments.

Section 14. All interest earned from funds paid into 14 Account No. 0396 by Act 87-761, Act 88-947, Act 89-79, Act 15 16 90-556, and Act 91-572 are hereby appropriated to the Governor's Contingency Fund to be spent at the discretion of 17 18 the Governor. Any other interest earned by the state from 19 Revenue Sharing Investments under the State and Local Fiscal 20 Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, Public Law 92-512, 92nd 21 Congress, together with any accruals or reversions thereon are 22 hereby appropriated to the State General Fund.

23 Section 15. All encumbered balances of a previous 24 fiscal year appropriation, other than the exclusions 25 authorized by this act or in Section 41-4-93, Code of Alabama 26 1975, shall lapse no later than September 30 of the fiscal 27 year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made and shall revert to the credit of the
 State General Fund or earmarked fund from which the
 appropriation or appropriations were made.

Section 16. The appropriations made herein to the 4 5 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 6 include the amounts necessary, and said departments, boards, 7 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in 8 said amounts enumerated in this act. All agencies enumerated 9 10 in this act and receiving services from other governmental 11 agencies enumerated in this act shall make full payment in a 12 timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such services. 13

Section 17. All funds collected under Section 14 15 40-12-43.1, Code of Alabama 1975, between the effective date 16 of Act 98-191 and September 30, 2022, are hereby appropriated to the Auburn University Center for Governmental Services for 17 the administration of the examiner certification program 18 19 established by the Alabama Local Tax Institute of Standards 20 and Training as provided in Section 40-12-43.1, Code of 21 Alabama 1975.

22 Section 18. It is the intent of the Legislature that 23 the funds appropriated to the Office of the Senate President 24 Pro Tempore in subsection 6 of Section 2A of this act which 25 are not otherwise designated may be expended by the Senate 26 President Pro Tempore for the same purposes as are authorized 27 for the Lieutenant Governor pursuant to Section 29-4-50, Code of Alabama 1975, and the Speaker of the House of
 Representatives pursuant to Section 29-4-60, Code of Alabama
 1975.

Section 19. The appropriations made herein to the 4 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 5 6 include the amounts necessary to pay the SEIB. The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each full-time employee for the 7 fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. The SEIB shall adjust 8 the insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the 9 aforementioned fixed rate; however, it is the intent of the 10 11 Legislature that the Board not increase the out of pocket 12 costs to active and retired members.

13 Section 20. It is the intent of the Legislature that 14 the Director of Finance shall notify the Chair of the House 15 Ways and Means-General Fund Committee, the Chair of the Senate 16 Finance and Taxation-General Fund Committee, and the 17 Legislative Fiscal Officer of any interagency transfers, of 18 any type, including contracting, of any of the funds 19 appropriated in this act.

20 Section 21. (a) All nongovernmental entities, identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are 21 22 allocated funds in Section 2 of this act shall file a report 23 with the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-General Fund 24 Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-General Fund, Finance Director, and the Legislative 25 26 Fiscal Officer prior to the start of the 2023 Regular Session, 27 regarding the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds

appropriated in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. The Legislative Services Agency shall provide notice to the identified nongovernmental entities within 60 days following enactment of this act regarding the reporting requirements and the methodology to submit reports and format to be used, which may include an online platform.

7 (b) In the event an entity was appropriated funds 8 from the State General Fund in the fiscal year ending 9 September 30, 2022, the entity shall also include in its 10 report a detailed breakdown of the expenditure and use of 11 those funds, including an inventory of the services delivered 12 and number of clients served, pursuant to guidelines 13 established by the Legislative Services Agency.

Section 22. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 14 15 clause, provision, or portion of this act or all or any 16 portion of any appropriations herein made be held unconstitutional or invalid, it shall not affect any other 17 section, paragraph, sentence, clause, provision, or portion of 18 19 this act or any other appropriation or appropriations or 20 portion thereof hereby made not in and of itself 21 unconstitutional or invalid.

22 Section 23. All laws or parts of laws, general, 23 special, private, or local that are in conflict with or 24 inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby 25 expressly repealed.

26 Section 24. Each agency of the state funded through 27 the provisions of this act shall provide an equal opportunity 1 for employment and business opportunities for all citizens of 2 this state without regard to sex or race.

3 Section 25. This act shall become effective October
4 1, 2022.
